

EIPIC Programme Stages and Role of Parents/Caregivers

	Phase	Your involvement as a parent/caregiver	Activities
1	Identifying your child's needs early	Provide consent as parents/caregivers	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Pediatrician assesses your child's needs and refers him/her to SG Enable for suitable EIPIC services. • SG Enable contacts you to share more information and discuss your options regarding the EI centre before referring your child to a centre. • The EI centre schedules an intake screening assessment to determine the strengths and needs of your child.
2	Supporting your child's progress in EI Sessions	<p>Be actively involved in the formulation and implementation of your child's IEP goals</p> <p>Receive training to extend good practices at home</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A transdisciplinary team of EI educators and AHPs provides support at the EI centre. • If your child is under the EIPIC Under-2s programme, your operator may also arrange for home visits. You will need to accompany your child during the intervention session to receive collaborative coaching to implement strategies for your child's daily routines at home. • If your child is not suited for centre-based intervention, the EI operator may also provide home-based intervention along with caregiver coaching. Home-based intervention in this case is short-term to encourage and motivate you and your family to engage your child actively. • The transdisciplinary team designs and reviews IEP goals for your child based on his/her developmental level and functional needs.
3	Celebrating your child's progress and preparing for transition to the next stage of education	Make the decision as a parent/caregiver for your child's educational progress after EIPIC.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Your child graduates from EIPIC when your child has met his/her intervention goals or when he/she is due for transition to primary school or to another suitable programme. You can celebrate progress made as a team! • EI educators will discuss possible pathways with you as your child approaches school-going age.
